**Before You Dig,  
Know What's Below**

There could be things below ground in your yards besides earth worms. It's also where utility lines are located, including the infrastructure for electricity, water, sewer, gas/petroleum, and communications. Before you begin any construction project (even small jobs like planting trees and shrubs), call 811 to get utility lines located and mark it for free. Keep in mind that the depth of utility lines varies in a common area. Digging without calling can disrupt service to an entire neighborhood, harm you and those around you, or even potentially result in fines and repair costs. With one quick call to 811, all utilities in your area will be notified and come and mark the location of their lines. When you call, be prepared to pinpoint the location of your dig site, describe the type of work to be done, and provide your planned start date for the project. Remember to call least two business days before you dig.

## Weather Storm Outages

Right around the corner is storm season in Nebraska. Here are a few suggestions on things to check if you lose your telephone or computer service after a storm. Power outages caused by lightening seem to be the main problem, causing cordless phones, answering machines, modems and routers to malfunction. Satellite receivers with pay per view modems can also lock up a phone line after an outage. If you experience outages after a storm, try unplugging these items from the power source and the phone jack, if necessary. After everything is disconnected, reconnect them one by one to see if power is restored.

## Peanut Butter Easter Eggs



### Ingredients

- 1 (16 ounce) package confectioners' sugar
- 1 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 8 (1 ounce) squares semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 tablespoon shortening

### Instructions

1. In a mixing bowl, combine confectioners' sugar, peanut butter, butter and milk (if needed for moisture) until blended. Shape mixture into two 1/2 pound eggs or make a bunch of smaller eggs. Freeze eggs for 1 hour.
2. While the eggs are freezing, cut semi-sweet chocolate into small pieces and place in top of double boiler with shortening. Melt over medium heat, stirring frequently until smooth. Stick a long-tined fork in top of each peanut butter egg, dip it in melted chocolate to cover then drain on waxed paper. When the eggs are cooled and set, decorate the eggs to suit your fancy.
